Message from the Chief:

I am pleased to submit to you the 2019 Annual Report of the Savannah Police Department. This past year has seen many changes to our approach to policing, which have led to a positive impact on our department and our city as a whole. As we began 2019, we took a new approach to our internal control processes with a shift in our focus to a more statistical approach to policing. As a Command Staff, we met with our line supervisors and explained that a new emphasis would be placed on officer activity as well as proactive policing. An officer of the month program was developed to reward those officers who go above the normal range for activity in the previous month. A daily activity report was developed and made a requirement of each patrol officer so that a log of their daily activity was created and available for review. A business walk through program was developed in an effort to increase officer-citizen interactions as well as reduce shoplifting. Lastly, the newly created position of Patrol Captain was tasked with the statistical tracking of the agency and a monthly report was posted so that officers could see in black and white their activity for the month.

Under the leadership of our two new Captains, we have seen much more efficiency within our department, as well as a dramatic increase in our community and proactive policing presence. Our case closure rate has increased by more than <u>18%</u> over last year due to the addition of our Criminal Investigations Division Captain, who acts as both an administrator and a third investigator. Our patrol officers have worked tirelessly to take drugs and drug offenders off the streets of Savannah, and our patrol division drug cases resulting in an arrest made were up by <u>28%</u> over 2018. <u>Overall, our crime rate in Savannah dropped 8% from last year, and violent crime was reduced by 15.7%.</u>

That said, any accomplishments that this department makes are not possible without the hard work, dedication, and determination of the men and women that come to work each day committed to making Savannah better. From the newest officer to the most senior employee, everyone understands their role in the big picture and embraces it to accomplish our mission. It is truly an honor to lead this department, and I look forward to what 2020 has in store.







Community Outreach

In 2019, SPD placed a new emphasis on community outreach in an effort to create more positive public/police interactions with the community we serve. In addition to our current programs we offer, this new initiative saw the creation of:

• Business Walk Thru Program

This program was a multifaceted approach of both the community outreach goal and that of the attempting to reduce the amount of shoplifting crimes in Savannah. In 2019, SPD patrol officers were required to select two businesses per officer per shift and walk through the business, introduce themselves to patrons/employees, and mingle with the public. In addition to this, day shift officers were required to make an additional walk through at the Tennessee Street Park and night shift officers had to do an additional business check at the Savannah/Hardin County Airport.

• National Night Out Against Crime (NNO)

This program was a collaborative effort spearheaded by the SPD in an effort to bring the community together and provide education and positive interactions. The first annual NNO was held on August 6th, and featured booths by the SPD, HC Sheriff, HC 911, Tennessee Highway Patrol, Tennessee State Parks, Savannah Fire Department, HC Fire Department, AirEvac 94, and Savannah Crime Watch. Hot Dogs, Chips, Drinks, and Balloons were donated by a local business, and served by SPD Officers.

• Coffee With a Cop Day


O This event was cosponsored by SPD and Windward Media and featured coffee, pastries, a photo booth, and conversation between SPD Officers and the public. There was a great turnout and we hope this program grows larger in years to come.

• Savannah Toys for Tots

This was our first year of partnering with the Savannah Fire Department, Midsouth T4T, and the US Marine Corp Reserve for Toys for Tots, and it was a great success. Through this partnership, SPD and SFD provided Christmas presents for 26 children from 18 families. Additionally, donations for our *Fill-a-Cruiser Toy Drive* far exceeded our expectations, and will go to helping provide Christmas to children in the area next year.

• Hardin County High School Drivers Education Partnership

O This new partnership allowed our officers to go into the Hardin County High School Driver's Education classes and provide insight and practical information on the dangers of drunk driving. Utilizing grant funds provided by the Tennessee Highway Safety Office, 6 pairs of *Fatal Vision* goggles were purchased and a complete presentation was given to the students. Students were told about the dangers of drunk driving, heard personal stories, and then got to experience the *Fatal Vision* goggles for themselves.




Overall, crime in Savannah has been relatively stable over the past five years, with the crime rate peaking in 2016 and then slowly decreasing each year since. This is attributed to the hard work and dedication of our officers who deeply desire to see that number continue to decline. Additionally, the amount of cases closed by either arrest or exemption has remained relatively constant over the 4 previous years, with that number seeing a significant jump in 2019. This can be attributed to better follow up performed by patrol officers, in addition to a third criminal investigator helping to solve and prosecute more cases.








*(Arrest or Exemption)




An increase in proactive policing was a goal for SPD in 2019. This included an increase in traffic enforcement with the intent of increased officer presence and deterrence while simultaneously increasing the pursuit and apprehension of offenders. Traffic enforcement is one of the primary physical deterrents that can have a positive impact on reducing the crime rate. In 2019, traffic stops increased by 56% compared to 2018. However, only 16.4% of those stops resulted in a citation being issued. Proportionally in 2018, 19.8% of traffic stops resulted in a citation. Even with the increase in total traffic stops performed in 2019, SPD officers are not disproportionally issuing more citations just because they are performing more enforcement stops. The percentage of drivers receiving a warning, either verbal or written, increased from 80.2% in 2018 to 83.6% in 2019.





Traffic Crashes returned to their average amount this year after a severe spike in 2018. We hope that through the continuation of our traffic enforcement program coupled with driver education programs and grant opportunities, this number will continue to decline in 2020.
